In recognition of her contributions to the school and the community in general, Miss Kidder was given the coveted Deborah Morton Award in 1961 by the whole Westbrook Family. Her achievements can be seen everywhere — from the ring personally made by Miss Kidder for

the finger of Senator Margaret Chase Smith to the hand-made braille textbooks which allow blind children to remain near their family and friends.


